WWFFG Meeting Sept 12th 2012

Presentation by Andy Burns the Chairman of Beckington Astronomical Society

The Transit of Venus - Astronomy and Fishing

This was 'astronomy unplugged' as over the course of an hour Andy, despite an obviously vast knowledge of his subject, avoided too much depth and gave us a most entertaining presentation. A very keen astronomer with his own observatory in Spain ("excellent local wine, cheese and brandy") he has lectured all over the world and been on TV - The One Show in 2011.

His talk was tailored closely to his Wednesday audience and made a fishing connection with every little astronomical nugget he gave us. At one moment he was explaining why a red sky at night is truly a shepherd's delight and at the next trying to get us to grasp the notion that the universe contains at a conservative estimate 250 billion galaxies like our Milky Way and in each 250 billion starts like our Sun. He took us around the world with examples of how cultures such as Tahitians, Aborigines and American Indians, sea-fishermen and

sea-farers have used the stars to anticipate weather changes and explain natural phenomena. He told us why Gravity, the smallest force in the universe, has the greatest influence and why full-moons affect Salmon fishing.

He also paid us the compliment that we would have studied Greek Mythology at school so we all nodded in remembrance of our classics teachers as he reminded us about the constellations and how they were named after the story of Perseus beheading The Gorgon Medusa and then falling for Andromeda - chained to the rocks by her father as sacrifice to the sea monster Cetus. The aquatic connections he had found for us came thick-and-fast.

Andy also talked about Hershel's museum in Bath (a visit recommended) where Hershel discovered the planet Uranus. Everyone who has taken tea at Jolly's in Milsom Street understood when Andy made the connection between Bath and a syphilitic C17th Venice. Twenty-nine out of every thirty people seen in Bath is a visitor - and doubtless some from Venice who will take back a souvenir they didn't buy at Jack's.

The Transit of Venus made a fleeting appearance but Andy's talk was about so much more and we'd like him to return to tell us more about Bath or Venice!



Better Use of Buzzers



As evenings grow darker in the Autumn, the Green Buzzer is deadly but UV does affect feeding of trout. Check the chart below for recommended Buzzer colour as selection can make a big difference according to the light conditions

Buzzer Colour	Daylight Most Effective In		
Scarlet	Very effective at dawn, dusk or dull days		
Orange and Yellow	Best on bright days		
Green	Coloured water and bad light		
Luminous and Sparkle	Best 1 hour before dawn and deadly 1 hour before dusk		
Flash Back and silver	Use any time of day		



Possibly the most underestimated flies in the fly angler's armoury are the humble buzzer flies that imitate a midge in its nymph stage ready to emerge into an adult. Starting life in muddy water as a bloodworm or chironomidae which is blood red in colour and changing into the midge as an adult. When ready to emerge it ascends to the surface of the water. This is when we use a trout buzzer to imitate this stage of the midge's life. Using small buzzers does work as a natural buzzer pupa can be just a few millimetres long. Believe it or not these little flies just 5 to 8 mm long can account for bagging huge trout, the reason is simple, they think they are eating something natural.
