

Bushyleaze Trout Fishery

- 22 acre lake
- minimum stocking size of two pounds
- good amount of four-to-six-pounders
- regular stocking of double figure fish
- stocked with Rainbow and Brown Trout

Rules:

FLY AND FLY FISHING TACKLE ONLY.

- 1. ALL FISH MUST BE KILLED, **NO CATCH AND RELEASE**. Any fish landed under 2 pounds need not be counted towards bag limit, so long as the fish is handed in at the lodge on your departure.
- 2. Only ticket holders are allowed to fish and only one non-fishing guest per angler.
- 3. All cars to be left in the car parks.
- 4. All fish are to be weighed and recorded at the lodge on leaving.
- 5. Fishery staff hold the right to return foul hooked fish.
- 6. Fishing on the river is strictly between the marked posts.
- 7. No damage whatsoever to trees and wildlife.
- 8. CLOSING TIMES may vary and will be displayed on the notice board. Postal Address: Lechlade and Bushyleaze Trout Fisheries,


NOW IT IS CULTURE TIME AGAIN

Milestones: - taken from a book by Dr. E.A. Barton (1943)

THERE are milestones in all men's lives as we pass along the road, and such stones are either brightly lit in sunshine, or are shrouded in the deepest shadow. Those early ones stand out very clearly - the first fight, the first serious love affair, or that moment when the nurse comes in and says, "It's a boy". There are dark ones too, which are never mentioned, and alas (!) never forgotten. But all such emotions pale into insignificance before the intoxication of that golden moment when the first big trout is captured. Many have written of that peep of Heaven, but in their writings one seems to have a suspicion that the pleasure of the relation is greater to the writer than to the reader: for so often it is but the childish prattle of anecdotage.

Be that as it may, but when aged thirteen I rose at dawn one peerless June morning and sneaked out of the house in stockinged feet, with my boots tied round my neck, a tin of worms in my pocket, and my rod disjointed, I felt like a convict escaping from prison with the dewy world literally at my feet. My bicycle, a pennyfarthing machine, lay against the wall. Slipping on my boots I climbed up the backbone into the seat and

was off to a small mill, which clacked but for a few hours' daily, not many miles away. Even now I can plainly see the miller, always an early riser, as he stands in the door of his mill against the flour-powdered ivy in the low sunlight of a summer morning, with the mill cat leaning against his leg. The Mill dam was too small to hold the water needful for a whole day's work, and a four-hour stretch would empty the dam: after which a halt was called till the brook that trickled into it filled it up again. At this early hour the dam was full and the overflow running bravely into a small mill-pool where a swirl of thickish water showed that road washings were running in after a wet night.

A bit of lobworm seemed to be an appropriate appetizer thus early in the day, so I pinched off a tail, ran the hook through it, and putting my float at three feet, cast it into the eddy where the bubbles were making a circular one-way traffic. Just as the float started on its second circuit something happened. It was slowly pulled out of the merry-go-round and drawn towards the hollow under the roots of an over-hanging willow across the way. I struck, and at that moment for the first time in my then short life I felt that thrill all down my spine which, however often repeated in after-life, never approaches that soul-awakening entry into a new world.

There was nothing really in it. The trout must have been about a pound, and after a few rushes I dragged it out into a shallow and fell on it, hugging it to my chest up the bank. Then I sat down and mentally re-enacted the whole drama; and a lump came up in my throat, and I felt as a philosopher has expressed it - "a great disposition to cry". It was the most lovely thing I had ever seen. I could fish no more. No anti-climax for me. I bicycled home with my head knocking the clouds, and my heart thumping against my ribs. And ever after, life had a new meaning.

Lot 23. Hardy LRH Lightweight Reel. This is certainly the most popular reel, first manufactured by Hardy in 1936 but still in production today. <u>Reserve of £35.</u>

Lot 24. JJS Walker Brampton 8' 6" split cane fly rod. The principles of JJS Walker were making rods before joining Hardy's around the start of the twentieth century. They fell out with Hardy over a patent dispute and started making rods in Alnwick, mostly with former hardy employees, and incorporating many Hardy features. <u>Reserve of £35.</u>

Lot 25. Hardy Wainless spinning Rod, about 7'. The rod, which is in good condition, has a new tip ring and one leg of the butt ring may have been rewhipped. Wanless was a well-known exponent of spinning, and this light rod was named after him. It has pretty fittings and Hardy inscriptions on the handle. <u>Reserve of £40.</u>
